

At first glance I thought of the strength and tenacity of the tree.

How in the world did it grow in the confines of this small brick silo?

I thought "poor tree"... confined to its limited surroundings.

But then. . . the leading of the Holy Spirit shed a different light.

I've recently come across the word "stronghold" several times in my Bible study, referencing the Lord.

Two are listed below:

Psalm 37:39

The salvation of the righteous is from the Lord; He is their stronghold in the time of trouble.

Proverbs 10:29

The way of the Lord is a stronghold to the blameless, but destruction to evildoers.

At first I saw the silo as a hindrance, limiting to the tree. But I sensed the Lord saying "look closer." The tree was healthy and green and growing. Maybe the silo was a strengthening presence to the tree --- an undergirding? Maybe it was a protection in case of storms? Could it be a barrier, preventing entrance of anything that could be destructive to the growth of the tree -- a sustaining presence?

Our strong God has given us laws for our protection, yet we often see them as limitations to our freedom We don't like being "constrained", we like to do what we want, when we want, as we want.

I think that's why my first observation was "poor tree", rather than "fortunate tree."

I'm quick to wrestle against so called "barriers", rather than embracing them as protection from a loving Father. He could have said "do what you want, I don't really care" but His commandments, along with the cross, said differently. .
